MARTIAL MATTERS: RACE, ENVIRONMENT, AND SURPLUS IN THE SUBURB

Between 2016 and 2019, thousands of migrant children were detained at the Homestead Temporary Shelter, a detention camp just south of Miami, Florida. Though ostensibly a place of refuge for asylum-seeking children, detained children were exposed to toxic and sonic hazards from an adjacent military base, a crucial node in the hemispheric circulation of weapons, soldiers, counterinsurgent expertise. Drawing on two years of ethnographic fieldwork with Indigenous Maya migrants and community organizers, soldiers and pro-military civilians, and environmental and municipal planners, this talk asks how the environmental surplus of war becomes a site of ambivalent political mobilization. Ethnographic attention to war's remains illuminates the detention camp not as a bounded space of exception but as permeable and embedded in suburban landscape—and part of a broader project of racialization in the Americas.



Emma Shaw Crane is Assistant Professor of Urban and Environmental Studies at Loyola Marymount University. She researches and teaches on race, environment, and U.S. empire. Her writing has appeared in Environment and Planning D, Public Culture, and Antipode. She received her PhD in American Studies from New York University. Emma's work is grounded in the principles and practices of research justice, and she writes with coalitions fighting migrant detention in South Florida. She grew up in Santa Rosa, California, and lives in Los Angeles.
